The Dream Center's long-term vision includes holistic initiatives to benefit the entire family. In our first 5-6 years we set and accomplished goals that focused on Impacting Youth. It is our plan to establish and sustain our organization so that we

may be able to impact this community for years to come. Our sustainability plan begins in 2021 with our goal to become a Licensed Child Care Center. This year's Annual Report will highlight our D.R.E.A.M. Center "In Your Life Mentoring" model and our vision for 2021.



Reflecting the Community

We are intentional in recruiting staff, mentors, and volunteers that reflect the community we serve. We seek to put our youth in a position to build relationships across racial and social-economic lines. Youth will experience what real community looks like.



Caring (in) Community

When our program hours end, our impact only begins. Our mentors impact youth outside the walls of the Dream Center. We connect caring adults in the child's life to build a community structure of people who genuinely care. It's not just programs, it's PERSONAL. OVER 50% OF OUR MENTORS LIVE AND WORK IN THE RADIUS OF THE KIDS WE SERVE



School Connectors

School Connectors are Dream Center staff members who are trained in reading prescriptions and math improvement strategies, utilized by District educators, to continue teaching the school day curriculum. School Connectors visit students during the school day each week to encourage student success in the classroom and support the Dubuque School Teachers.



Youth Enrichment

We are a Sports, Music, and Performing Arts Academy that provides youth with structure, discipline, responsibility, and skills they can continue in high school, college, and career. Dream Center activities include basketball, choir, dance, guitar/piano lessons, and boxing.



Building Community

We are intentional in building purposeful and healthy relationships with our students and their entire family. Our Parent Focus Group is foundational in creating long lasting relationships in a way that provides parents an additional support system outside of immediate family members. Our desired outcomes for building community includes contributing to a unified, safe, and equitable community.

IN YOUR LIFE MENTORS

ream Center's direct service staff are called
School Connectors. School Connectors are the Dream Center activity coaches and mentors who are also responsible for overseeing youth academic and character development

outcomes. School connectors supervise and instruct youth at 3 Stations; Academic Center, Club Sports or Music & Performing Arts Activity, & Meal Mentoring.

Each School Connector is responsible for a Team. A Team is a Sports or Music and Arts Team such as a Dance Team or Choir. Our goal is to have a 1: 10 ratio of School Connectors per student for quality impact.

The Dream Center has full-time and part-time School Connectors. Full-time Connectors are Dream Center staff who oversee Dream Center programming after school and conduct school visits during the school day to support teachers and students they oversee at each school site. Parttime School Connectors are School Teachers/
Paraprofessionals who work after school at the Dream Center.

n Summer 2019,
in partnership with
Dr. Ed (Pat) Alt,
Greater Dubuque
Development's Dubuque
Works initiative, and NICC,
the Dream Center piloted
their Career Development
Program. The goal of this
program is to focus

on the future to impact generational poverty by developing the future workforce. Students gained training and employment experience in partnership with Northern Iowa Community College (NICC). Initially, students will focus on their individual career assessment, soft skill development, and job & career readiness training.

In 2020 we had 11 students enrolled in our Youth Career Development Program.

Throughout this pandemic the students that enrolled in our Youth Career Development Program faced adversity by showing up to work each day on time, eagerly learned new skills, and on August 7th, they graduated! Students were evaluated on the following soft skills: accountability, attendance, punctuality, communication skills, work ethnic, and more.





LANDON

3RD GRADE


When speaking to his coach and teacher about his biggest improvement this school year they both said the same thing, his attitude and effort. His teacher, Mrs. Davis, said his biggest improvement was his attitude towards writing during his independent work every day. She also said how proud she was of him for meeting his Math MAP testing goal. Coach Blake said Landon really came out of his shell this year and gave a great effort when learning new things, such as reading, which did not come easy. When looking at the data from the past two school years it all aligns, Landon has moved from being at high reading risk in 2nd grade to some reading risk in 3rd grade. He has also improved his Reading MAP score from 161 at the beginning of 2nd grade to 193 in the winter of 3rd grade. This is only 3 points below where he needs to be, to be considered at reading proficiency in the winter of 3rd grade. He has also made big improvements on his Math MAP test by going from a 179 at the beginning of 2nd grade to 198 during the winter of 3rd grade. This puts him at math proficiency for his grade level! It is without a doubt that with Landon continuing to work hard he will meet his reading proficiency goal next year and continue to excel above the expectation in both reading and math.

JAMARIA

5TH GRADE

Jamaria just completed her first year in the program. Her coach says, "Jamaria is very helpful, focused, and accountable during our academic station. She has impressed me with her maturity inside and outside of the classroom. She has shown determination in this first year of being on the basketball team and is a very motivated individual. We are so grateful to have her as a part of our program!" Jamaria is a model student when it comes to academics. She's at reading and math proficiency for her grade level, but that does not stop her from pushing herself to excel further. She was awarded the American Legion Award this year. This award is determined by a rubric that encompasses standardized test scores, student involvement in activities, and positive behavior choices. Jamari's principal, Mrs. Chris Nugent said, "Jamaria has always been a good student. As she has matured, it has been fun to watch her leadership skills grow in a positive way." Jamaria's mother also added that, "she is more outgoing, social, and has enjoyed making new friends at the Dream Center. She really loves being a part of a team at the center. Being at the center has helped her build more confidence in herself as far as trying new things."

NICHOLAS

8TH GRADE

Nicholas ended the school year with a 4.0 GPA. He made major improvements in school office referrals. He went from 8 referrals in 7th grade, to only 1 referral in 8th grade! Nicholas' mom said she is most impressed with his overall behavior and respect. She is impressed how he addresses women as "ma'am" and men as "sir." He has also improved on listening to advice from others. She said, "he is a totally different kid from four years ago and none of this would be possible without the Dream Center."

KYRI 2ND GRADE

Kyri has been attending the Dream Center since he was in 1st grade at Prescott. Kyri's mother says, "Since starting at the Dream Center, Kyri has really been working extra hard at home and at school. He enjoys the Dream Center and being able to play his favorite sport, which is basketball. Kyri used to be shy but now he is far from that!" His reading and math test scores are able to prove that he has been working extra hard. His Reading FAST score went from being at high risk of reading difficult to some risk from last year to this year. His Math MAP score went from a 157 to 171, up 14 points, from Fall to Winter of 2nd grade! With Kyri continuing to work hard over the next school year we expect his scores to continue to improve, putting him at grade level in the near future! Kyri's mom added, "Keep up the awesome work Kyri, and keep making your mom and big brother proud!"





RAEVYNN

3RD GRADE

She just completed her 2nd year in Dream Center programming and has a lot to show for it! Raevynn's coach said, "It has been a joy to watch Raevynn's weekly improvements right in front of my eyes. She is constantly growing in the area of reading. She gets more and more fluent each week I read with her and listen to her read. She never settles and is very determined to always do her best." Her academics and behavior have improved since being at the Dream Center. She was able to push herself from being at Reading Benchmark/ Grade Level, in 2nd grade, to being Above Reading Benchmark, in 3rd grade. Her Math and Reading MAP Scores have also made improvements this year, putting her at proficiency level for both. One of her biggest accomplishments this year has also been her improved behavior at school. Last year she had 10 office referrals and this year she had ZERO! We are so proud to have Raevynn as part of the Dream Center and all her hard work this year!

AMIRA

3RD GRADE

She has been participating in the Dream Center program for the past two years. Amira's coach said, "she has grown tremendously in the area of her work ethic from when I first started coaching her last summer, to now. During the Academic Center, she is quick to get her homework done with a volunteer and move onto the next task she knows she needs to accomplish." Amira and her family have been committed to making sure that Amira's attendance is great not only at school but also during school year and summer Dream Center programming. By being committed to attending every program day, Amira has not regressed a lot over the summer months, like many kids do. By attending Dream Center summer program, she was able to improve her Math MAP score by 8 points from the end of 2nd grade to the beginning of 3rd grade. This put Amira at math proficiency level! Her consistency and hard work ethic has also put her at reading proficiency.

Virtual Programming

The Dream Center canceled traditional programming to provide virtual lessons, academic support, and delivered meals to our students, families, and other community members.

Meals

Our meal service provided families with breakfast, lunch, supper, and snacks for all children in the home, 5 days per week. There were many families that struggled with the concept of leaving their homes, especially those with multiple children, so our staff delivered 95% of the meals in various neighborhoods in Dubuque.

Academic Support

We sent customized academic work packets, to our students to continue progress towards math and reading proficiency. This was in addition to what was provided by our local school district.

Communication

Our School Connectors maintained relationships with students through phone calls, texts, and Zoom. These calls served as a way to keep in touch with families to find out how they're doing and what their needs are, outside of just meals and academic support. Our students and parents continue to depend upon the Dream Center to meet their holistic needs.

Since March 23rd we sent 225 academic lesson plans and delivered 79,122 meals to families in the community. "You do not realize how hard it is to feed five kids all day every day until you have to," says Dream Center parent Erica.

CHILDCARE AND STUDENT SPONSORSHIP CAMPAIGN

he Dream
Center raises
73% of our
operational
budget through fundraising
from generous private
donors from the community
of Dubuque to support
low income and working
families who need
affordable care for their
children.

In order to progress towards sustainable income to continue to provide quality and affordable care to the children of working families, the DC is seeking to become a Licensed Child Care Facility and generate funding support from the State of lowa by Fall 2021.

The Dubuque Dream Center becoming a licensed childcare facility means access to affordable childcare for working families.

Our Student Sponsorship program is designed to assist low income families that do NOT meet the Department of Human Services requirements for financial child care assistance, but are unable to afford the annual program fees.

The Dubuque Dream
Center is running an Annual
Student Sponsorship
Camapaign from October—
December 2020 to secure
funding for 2021 in order
to serve 200 students and
their families as we seek
to become a Licensed
Child Care Site and
receive income from
the State of lowa.

Programming costs:

\$4,000 annually per student. Total Student Sponsorship Campaign goal \$800,000.

Facility Renovation Project:

By renovating the present Dubuque Dream Center facility, we will be able to obtain a childcare license.

- Bathrooms and Elevator
